Letter from Our Executive Director



My first annual report marks the completion of my first year at *Alexandria House*. I am so grateful for the staff who have graciously brought me into the team and have been instrumental in my acclimation to *Alexandria House*. I am full of gratitude for our Board of Directors that has linked arms with me as we have taken on some hefty initiatives. I am in awe of the ongoing support of the numerous volunteers who are part of the fabric of *Alexandria House* and help us in more ways than I could ever describe. And I am so appreciative to all our donors, who have helped us make the impossible possible.

Because of this incomparable team of staff, volunteers, and donors, as well as our alum and women who call **Alexandria House** home for now, we have been able to accomplish remarkable achievements:

- We are almost finished with the second phase of the Kenmore Building project, completing the renovation of the **39 units** in the building we purchased in February 2022. In addition, we have moved in nine new families who were precariously housed;
- In April 2023, we purchased the Green and Yellow House thanks to a bridge loan from a generous donor, ensuring that *Alexandria House* would remain in perpetuity embedded in the Koreatown community and offering support to our neighbors;
- We grew our team from 18 to 29 staff in fiscal year 2022-23, building necessary capacity to meet and expand our programs;
- Thanks to all of you, we had our biggest fundraiser ever, *WomenSpeak* 2023, where we raised \$100,000 to support our growing operation expenses;
- We had nearly three dozen women graduate from Start Up Sisterhood LA (SUSLA), our 14week business intensive training program which supports them in starting their own businesses. In response to the overwhelming success of the SUSLA model, we onboarded a Director of Job Development and Entrepreneurship to grow our job readiness services;
- We grew our operating budget to nearly **\$3,500,000** as we focus on expanding critical services for the women and families we serve; and
- We expanded our visibility and footprint on social media, reaching thousands!





Alexandria House strives for a just world that deserves all of us — by intentionally addressing the root causes of injustice and oppression for vulnerable women & families. Alexandria House is a nexus of community, partnership, power-building, and healing. We know from nearly three decades of resistance and disruption that we are stronger and better together. We are honored to be one of many organizations fighting for a brighter future; and the partnerships we've nurtured move our collective visioning closer to reality:



Alexandria House supported SB1085 authored by California Senator Sydney Kamlager's (D-30) and championed by A New Way of Life Reentry Project. SB1085 changes the state's Welfare & Institutions Code to prohibit family courts from separating a child from his/her family solely because of poverty, and is key in limiting the unwarranted separation of California families by the Department of Children and Family Services (DCFS). Observers say this law establishes a national precedent.

Michelle Tonn was selected as one of 20 PPC delegates to represent California at the 2023 Moral Poverty Action Congress (MPAC) in Washington DC in June. Delegates from 30 states spoke to over 400 congressional leaders about the devastating effects of poverty.

Dear Friends,

There is an often-told parable of babies floating down a river, with some people rescuing them from drowning and others going "upstream" to figure out why this is happening and what needs to change. For me, this annual report for 2022-2023 is a reflection and testimony to the critical importance of doing both—direct service and systemic change work for the sake of justice. Since our beginnings in 1996, both of these components have been significant parts of our mission.

What is so clear is that *Alexandria House* could not engage in these efforts without the support of so many, and without the multiple ways people share in the mission. We are extremely grateful for what Martin Luther King named "the inescapable network of mutuality."

The other significant learning for me over the years is that once people are on safe ground; once folks escape a river of debt, destruction, and even despair; once there is a life-line of support and care, then people can breathe a little easier. And change happens. Stability, creativity, and hope resurfaces. Many of the women who have found safe ground at *Alexandria House* have a story of survival that they want to share. They offer a clear analysis of what policies and practices need to change if there is to be equity and justice. They become our much needed truth-tellers and lead organizers for a better and more just society and world.

In a conversation with Sandy Nguyen, our recently hired Volunteer & Resource Coordinator, the question was raised about her first experiences at *Alexandria House*. Sandy mentioned solidarity, reciprocity and a recognizable passion for justice. She also added a sense of joy and vibrancy. Whether you are new to the *Alexandria House* community or have been a member for many years, thank you for being a part of our "inescapable network of mutuality." May you find much joy in these difficult and challenging times.

Start Up Sisterhood LA (SUSLA) Resourcing Economically Just & Secure Futures

Since our founding 27 years ago, *Alexandria House* has been a welcoming house of hospitality, guided by our community in how to best meet their needs. Through the years, we have done so through an intersectional and multi-pronged strategy –addressing the root causes of homelessness and providing supportive services such as: housing, childcare, after-school support, case management, therapy, and fulfilling basic needs.

Our SUSLA program was born in 2020, during the height of the COVID-19 pandemic, when many of our past residents working in hospitality and service-based industries lost their jobs and were looking for new ways to support their families. SUSLA was the answer to an overwhelming call of our residents seeking support in acquiring the necessary skills to start their own businesses. SUSLA is a 14-week business-intensive experiential training program that builds, nurtures, and supports our budding community of entrepreneurs. Miguel Soltero, of RE3 Construction Group taught the first cohort of SUSLA, and Ngozika O'keke, of Ngozika O'keke Clothing and SuperCrownz, began teaching in Fall of 2022.

In 2023, after two cohorts of SUSLA had been completed, our village identified a new need: job development support for women in our community seeking financial stability. As a result and with the support of the SAM Initiative, *Alexandria House* welcomed a new Director of Job Development and Entrepreneurship, Jacqueline (Jackie) Perez Valencia, to support our community. In her role, Jackie assists our participants in obtaining livable wage jobs and helps them explore new career paths. This is done through resume writing, mock interviews, dress-for-success pop-ups, supporting our participants in attending career/job fairs and providing job training like our Coding Bootcamp that will afford them higher wages. Most importantly, both arms of SUSLA (entrepreneurship and job development) nurture the women's connection to each other, strengthen their support system, build their self-confidence and agency, and move the needle forward on economic justice.

In the past year, we have seen the growth of businesses like Carolina's Flavors, a Mexican and Soul Food fusion catering company owned and operated by Carolina, a past resident. During a recent class, a SUSLA participant mentioned that before starting this program she found herself underpaying herself and sometimes even losing money when operating her cake business. Now, as her confidence grows, she feels good charging what her craft is worth and strategically prices her goods so she can make a profit. And with the support of mentors, our participants will receive the additional individualized guidance they need to launch or grow their businesses.

One thing that has stood out over the past year is the commitment of the SUSLA participants to come to *Alexandria House* every Wednesday mid-afternoon despite their other responsibilities. We mitigate their needs by providing childcare, transportation, and dinner to ensure those barriers are removed, but without question, these women are making a big investment in their future. And the impact that SUSLA is having in these women's lives is reverberating among our growing community as evidenced by a waiting list for the next cohort. In the next year, we estimate over 100 women will benefit directly from SUSLA's two arms, steadying their foundation for an economically just and secure future.

We are grateful to our community partners, supporters, donors, mentors, and volunteers who have championed SUSLA over the past few years. We know that with ongoing support, we will continue to help women address the systemic challenges that have historically kept them marginalized and assist them in being able to financially support themselves and their families.
